One director from each district will seek re-election this year. They are



SUMMER STORM SAFETY WORD SEARCH

- If you hear thunder, that means lightning can strike nearby. Go indoors.
- Wait at least 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder before going back outside.
- During a thunderstorm, stay away from tall, isolated structures or trees, which are more susceptible to lightning strikes.
- Avoid standing near windows during a thunderstorm.
- Strong summer storms occasionally cause power outages. During an outage, it's best to have an emergency kit on hand.

Our Commitment to Serving You is Not in Short Supply

hile things could be much worse, Farmers Electric has experienced its share of challenges so far in 2022.

Certain equipment is in very short supply, and other items have very long lead times. Hopefully, the supply chain will start to correct itself this year and ease the pressure on wait times for the transformers and meter loops we need most.

We've also seen an uptick in outages this spring, mostly due to raccoons. Lightning, wind, and accidents involving electric poles and vehicles have also contributed to power outages. We are trying to add more insulated cover-up at our substations to prevent outages caused by animals, but these materials are also in short supply.

When we do experience an outage, the equipment in our substations and on our lines will de-energize to protect the equipment and lines from further damage. If your power suddenly goes out this is often due to a fault on the lines or equipment that results in a blown fuse. If your power blinks several times before going out, this is most likely due to a

recloser operating before tripping out. The reason it operates and blinks your lights is to attempt to clear the fault (animal, tree limb, etc.) and not result in a power outage. If this doesn't clear the outage, then the

recloser will lock open and the line will remain de-energized until our crews can find the problem.

Fruit Pizza

1 lb. package premade PillsburyTM sugar cookie dough (or homemade)

8 oz. Cool Whip[®], softened

4 oz. cream cheese, softened

2 T. sugar

1 tsp. vanilla extract

Fruit topping:

15 oz. can sliced mandarin oranges, drained

2 kiwis, peeled and sliced

1 lb. strawberries, halved or quartered

1 pint raspberries and/or blueberries

15 oz. can pineapple chunks, drained

Preheat oven to 350 and lightly grease a round glass pizza pan. Press cookie dough into the pan to about 1/8" thick. Pierce several times with a fork. Bake for 8-10 minutes, until edges are lightly golden. Let cool completely. In a large bowl, whip together cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Fold in Cool Whip. Once crust has cooled, spread frosting evenly over sugar cookie with a spatula. Top with your favorite fruit and enjoy!

Strawberry Lemonade Cookies

1 box Betty CrockerTM Delight Strawberry Cake Mix

1 box Betty CrockerTM Delight Lemon Cake Mix

4 large eggs, divided

2/3 c. vegetable oil, divided

3 tsp. lemon juice, divided

2/3 c. powdered sugar

Glaze

2 T. cold water or lemon juice

1 1/2 c. powdered sugar

In a medium bowl, whisk together 2 eggs, 1/3 c. oil, 1 1/2 tsp. lemon juice. Stir in lemon cake mix; set aside. In a separate medium bowl, whisk together remaining 2 eggs, 1/3 c. oil, 1 1/2 tsp. lemon juice. Stir in strawberry cake mix; set aside. Refrigerate dough at least 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 350. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper; set aside. Generously sprinkle two separate large plates with powdered sugar. Scoop about 1/2 T. of lemon dough and roll in powdered sugar, leaving the dough balls on the plate. Repeat until you have enough dough balls to fill the baking sheet. Repeat with strawberry cookie dough using the second plate of powdered sugar to coat and placing back on plate. Roll one lemon ball and one strawberry ball together. Place on baking sheet one inch apart. Sprinkle with a little powdered sugar. Bake 10-13 minutes or until slightly golden around the edges. Refrigerate remaining dough in between uses. Transfer baked cookies to cooling wire rack. Repeat with remaining dough. Combine ingredients for glaze and drizzle over cooled cookies with spoon.
